Don't believe everything you read online!

Questions to ask when evaluating what you see on the web:

AUTHORITY

- O Who are the authors or who is responsible for the information?
- o Is the author or organization qualified to provide the information?

ACCURACY

- O Do you have good reason to believe that the information on the site is accurate?
- O Are the facts documented?

OBJECTIVITY

- O What is the purpose of the site?
- O What is the author's point of view?
- o Is the information unbiased or does the website admit to its bias?

CURRENCY

- O When was the information on the page originally written?
- O Has the site been revised or updated?

COVERAGE

O How much and how well is the information covered?
