Library patrons who renewed their cardholder status or registered for a library card for the first time in September were eligible for the prize drawing. Also eligible were patrons who referred a new patron. The library registered 1,458 new cardholders during the month.

Among other things, the iPad can be used to download eBooks and eAudiobooks from the GRRL Digital Library.

Strategic Planning Process Under Way To Determine Region's Future Needs, Services

What should Great River Regional Library be doing three, six or nine years from now? No doubt the library will still have books, DVDs and CDs on the shelf and be providing information access via digital technologies. But the entire book publishing industry is uncertain about its future, and libraries now function in a dynamic environment influenced by technological innovation. Do library programs and the library collection need a new direction? Are public needs changing, and how can the library prepare itself to meet those needs?


To answer those questions the library's

administration has initiated a strategic planning process. Staff and community leaders have been conducting SWOT (strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, threats) analysis meetings to help the administration get a broad view of how the library can address community needs. Information from those meetings is helping the library's management team determine what direction the library should take in future years. The result will be a new strategic plan that aligns public need and public services in the best way possible.

"Meeting the changing needs of the community is of utmost importance for the future of the library, and this is our time to get it right," said GRRL Director Kirsty Smith.

The current strategic plan covers 2010-2012. It includes initiatives such as the Every Child Read to Read program, the implementation of a proactive 'weeding' process of outdated material, and an evaluation of using radio frequency identification technology to replace item barcodes, all of which were completed. The new strategic plan will probably include similar concrete goals. The process is scheduled to be completed by the end of the year.

Golden delayed her retirement to provide training and ensure a smooth transition between her leadership and Grussing's. The position oversees selection and purchasing of all books, CDs, DVDs, databases and electronic resources. In addition, Grussing makes decisions about the addition or deletion of formats from the collection and the withdrawal of old and outdated materials. He oversees the Technical Services department that repackages, labels and catalogs new items; supervises the Distribution department responsible for shipping items to and from the 32 GRRL locations; and supervises the interlibrary loan service.

A book Grussing recently read and recommends is "Telegraph Avenue" by Michael Chabon, a novel praised in Esquire magazine as "A genuinely moving story about race and class, parenting and marriage...."

Leap Into Reading Hopper Makes Friends Region-Wide

Copper the frog has been traveling around the Great River Regional Library region, making friends wherever he goes. He's a plush and stylish superstar.

Hopper's cousin Read-It was adopted by the Minnesota Department of Education (DoE) as a mascot for a statewide "Leap Into Reading" early childhood literacy initiative. Read-it has joined Education Commissioner Dr. Brenda Cassellius on travels to schools and education organizations around the state to promote early childhood reading.

The DoE provided Minnesota's regional library systems with frogs so they could partner in the fun. Each of the 32 GRRL locations will present a froggy reading program this year. Some locations bring real live frogs and amphibians in the library, or stage frog races, and all have frog stories. The point is to attract children and make their storytime at the library learning fun.

W ith more than 2 million lessons in over 3,000 language courses and 45,000 hours of MP3 files for learning on the go, Pronunciator provides flexible, easy to use learning for 60 languages free of charge to GRRL patrons.

The new language learning option for library patrons simplifies the learning process. Course modules begin with vocabulary words, progress through simple sentences, and eventually immerse the learner in a virtual conversation mode. All of it is self-paced.

To begin language learning with Pronunciator, visit the GRRL website and take these simple steps: Click on Databases, click on Pronunciator, then follow the on-screen directions requiring an email address and library card number. Pronunciator will provide a student name and password for log in.

To upload successfully, Pronunciator requires a web browser with JavaScript enabled, and Flash version 10.0 or greater.

Pronunciator is the brainchild of librarian and entrepreneur Robert Savage. a publishing industry professional whose resume is sprinkled with international assignments. He launched his language learning service just over a year ago after two years of development involving nearly 1,000 people across more than 60 countries.

Escape Into Reading This Winter

Would-Be City Administrators Give Libraries High Priority



An informal Minnesota State Fair survey placed libraries near the top of the public service priority list for visitors to the Cities Matter booth in the Education Building.

For the third year in a row, State Fair attendees visiting the booth had the opportunity to be a "city bean counter." Each person was given a six-bean budget with a goal of deciding how to "spend" their beans among eight different city services. They were permitted to allocate all of their beans to a single service or to divide them any way they wished.
