New Core Values and Strategic Plan Set Course for Future Library Activity

The information environment in which libraries function is being transformed, even if it seems they have an unchanging mission and purpose.

Fifteen years ago librarians were busy answering questions across the desk, usually using reference books that only they knew how to find and search. Today's patrons are more likely to need help managing and selecting from the mountain of information available at Google, YouTube and elsewhere. A genealogy resource such as Ancestry.com wasn't even available ten years ago. Today, the job of our librarians is to help you get the most out of the time you spend searching there and elsewhere online.

During 2015, Great River Regional Library went through a process to review its core values and strategic plan. The process included public feedback obtained through surveys and community meetings, as well as input from regional stakeholders and the GRRL Board of Trustees. The goal was to make sure we do know where we are going, and that we are all headed in the same direction! Here is an abbreviated version.

Strategic Plan for 2016-2020

The library mission is: Explore, Learn, Connect.

The library's vision is: The neighborhood gateway: Inspiring Central Minnesota to shape the future through exploration, knowledge and connection.

The library is a patron centered organization, and this commitment is expressed through three core values: *Exceptional Service, Forward Thinking, and Community Focus*.

The library's service priorities are:

Literacy: All users will have the resources they need to develop and improve their literacy skills in order to succeed in school, meet their personal goals and fulfill their responsibilities as students, parents, citizens and workers.

Access: All users will have access to reliable sources of information in welcoming virtual or physical spaces that support community connection and engagement.

Lifelong Learning: All users will have the resources they need to explore topics of personal interest, continue to learn and complement their quality of life

The library's organizational priorities are:

Exceptional Service: We will be an empowered, engaged, well-trained staff ready to provide exceptional service.

Operational Excellence: We will use resources effectively in order to be adaptable to future needs.

Community Focus: We will enhance our service to current and future patrons by embracing the diversity of our communities



Friends Meet Friends Planned For Fall

A fall Friends Meet Friends event is being planned to take place at the St. Cloud Public Library on Thursday, Sept. 22.

The event highlight will be an interactive presentation provided by Sue Hall, Director of the Library Strategies Consulting Group, which is an arm of the St. Paul Friends of the Library.

In addition, the meeting will give the groups an opportunity to share ideas and information on recruitment, fundraising, ways to support the library, etc.

Twenty-seven GRRL library branches have Friends groups. Together, their efforts provide tremendous support to GRRL, but all of them operate independently. Most provide resources to just their own local branch, but the St. Cloud Friends of the Library use revenue from the bookstore they operate in the library to support numerous regionwide efforts. In 2015 the St. Cloud Friends donated \$33,179.55.

The library's public relations department will host the event.



Wish List Opens Door To Specific Donations

o you have a wish list, something posted on the refrigerator, or more likely written in a journal? If not, there's probably a wish list posted inside your mind. Depending on where you are at with your life it might look like this:

"I wish I could spend more time with the grandkids."
"I wish my daughter/son could meet a nice boy/girl."

"I wish the rabbits would quit eating my flowers."

And probably for most of us, "I wish we could all just settle our differences and get along!" The library's wish list is a little different. We have a special WishList you can find on the library's website, griver.org. That's where the library shares lists of books, music and movies staff wish they could purchase, but that we don't because popular demand for other items is greater. Not everything on the WishList is a book, DVD or music. GRRL is hoping to purchase more of the We Play Here kits that encourage young children to learn through play at the library. Twenty initial kits were purchased through grant funding, and mini kits have been purchased by the Howard Lake Friends of the Library. It will cost another \$3,000 to purchase 12 more so that each branch can keep a kit on hand. Thanks to the Annandale Area Friends of the Library who have donated \$300 to get the ball rolling on this wish. Another \$2,700 is being sought.

Also highlighted on the WishList right now are the Complete Basement Tapes by Bob Dylan, a six disc set of 1967 recording sessions with the Band. Great music from a great time for people of the Woodstock generation. Cost is \$120. If you're a person who would enjoy Dylan and the Band, you might also enjoy "Haight: Love, Rock, and Revolution," a book of sixties-era San Francisco photography, available for a WishList donation of \$50.

GRRL would also love to purchase a large quantity of Lego building blocks that children can use in a makerspace. The estimated cost of this item is \$5,000.

WishList donations can be made at any level, online or by check.

Get Ready For VuFind: a Better Library Catalog

et ready to see some changes. The library catalog and website are going through a complete redesign process to make them easier to use, no matter what kind of device or computer they are viewed on.

As part of this process, the library is moving its catalog to a new search engine called VuFind. The classic catalog is in place alongside the new VuFind catalog for the time being. But before the summer ends, everyone will be using the new version.

Many people now view Internet pages through smartphones, so webmasters have been forced to build new pages with responsive web design, meaning that the page responds to the screen it is viewed on. Redesigning the library's website to be responsive has given staff the opportunity to also review and upgrade its content.

The new catalog is built with open source software; the library will not have to pay or wait for changes and improvements. Instead, the library's IT staff will write code to make improvements where necessary. Some of that is already taking place.

Patrons are trying the new catalog and letting staff know how they feel it can be further improved.

Right out of the box the new catalog allows for both broader and more refined searches.

It's hard to comprehend the work that went into keeping track of all the library's materials before computerized automation: the endless stamping of cards and filing to ensure nothing went astray. Computers changed all that, but even computers need upgrades. This new catalog is another step, another improvement, in that process.

Read for the Win In GRRL's Summer Reading Program

cummers are busy. The warm weather encourages kids to climb on their bikes and ride around town. It's not unusual for them to meet friends in our buildings. Often, in the summer, whole new families arrive at the library, especially if they have children eager to sign up for summer reading.

Staff look forward to the energy these children bring. This year's program theme is *Read For The Win*. It's a theme designed to take advantage of the Olympic competition that gets underway in August.

The library offers three programs for different age groups: an early literacy program for ages 0 to 5, an independent reading program for ages 3 to 12, and a teen program for grades 6 to 12. Branches are selecting individual prizes to encourage participation, and each library will have two Grand Prizes, such as T-ball sets for youngsters, and the Scrabble Jr. game for older children.

All of GRRL's 32 branches will select from a menu of programming options and fun games for children to play such as sports trivia, make & takes and a Tape Line Challenge for 5 and younger. We're offering Nature Olympics with St. John's Outdoor University, Animal Tracks, Food Bingo, Bruce the Bug Guy, Ice Cream Socials, magicians, jugglers, yo-yo champions and much, much more. Read Down Fines

"Read Down Your Fines" will take place again Monday, June 20 through Saturday, June 25.

This event is for children and teens who hold 'minor' cards and are unable to borrow library materials because of outstanding fines. It gives them the opportunity to regain library privileges just by reading at the library.

Individuals taking part in the program will get a coupon from the library desk on which they record their time spent reading in the library. They are allowed to read materials of their choice, but it must be physical print materials such as a book or magazine. For each 15 minutes spent reading, they eliminate \$1 in fines.

Read Down can only be applied to fines for late return of materials. It can't be applied to fines or processing fees for lost and damaged items.

Read Down Your Fines is totally paid for through public donations. Since it was introduced in 2013, more than 800 teens and children have taken advantage of this program and begun using the library again. The average fine paid off is approximately \$5.
